Report on Progress And Future Developments 2015-2016

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About our school

Bathgate West Nursery School serves the community of Bathgate and the surrounding area. During session 2015-2016, the nursery school roll was 50 morning and 40 afternoon children, increasing to 50 afternoon children in April.

Balbardie Primary School is a non-denominational school serving the community of Bathgate. The school accommodates 16 mainstream primary classes and three Autism Resource classes. Our current school roll is 455 and our FME is 20.2%. The school has a wide ranging catchment area, with 53% of children attending in Deciles 1,2 and 3, providing an exciting opportunity for the school to address the 'closing the gap' agenda.

The school has effectively managed a change in management structure, due to a number of staff successfully undertaking seconded promoted posts out-with and within school. There is strong leadership at all levels and a clear commitment from teaching and support staff to career long professional learning.

The school continues to provide extensive support to parents and families to ensure children's social, emotional and wellbeing needs are being met. In Bathgate West Nursery and Balbardie Primary, we aim to create a learning environment where everyone is given the opportunity to **achieve**, **believe** and **celebrate**.

How well did we do in 2015/16?

Priority 1

We have made good progress.

A working group looked closely at the planning and delivery of social studies (people, past events and societies, places and environments). Staff engaged in professional reading and dialogue around the key messages of the Social Subjects 'Principles and Practices' paper. Through collegiate activity, staff engaged with Education Scotland's suite of resources and familiarised themselves with the Significant Aspects of Learning. Drawing on identified good practice locally and nationally, staff evaluated current areas of strength within the school's Social Subjects delivery, identified areas for development and created a plan to address improvement areas. Science also become a point of focus and we've purchased a valuable resource called Sciencebug to enhance the delivery of Science and to ensure breadth and depth in teaching.

Priority 2

We have made good progress.

Our school promotes and ensures equality and fairness through the curriculum and all aspects of our work where everyone is given the opportunity to achieve, believe and celebrate. The culture, systems and practice for the development of wellbeing are well established and clearly embedded in all aspects of supporting our children and families.

The school continues to add value to children's attainment at almost all stages, and is performing well with comparator schools, and at local authority and national level in adding value to our children's attainment in literacy and numeracy. Most children are attaining very well in reading, writing and listening and talking across all stages of the school, with able learners being appropriately challenged. The school has very effective systems, procedures and interventions to identify and meet the needs of all pupils, including our vulnerable children. Pupil voice continues to be developed through the Wee Nursery Natter and the Big Balbardie Blether. The nursery engaged with Building the Ambition training and West Lothian Early Years Framework and this has had a positive impact on the development of an enquiry based curriculum which provides open-ended learning opportunities, curiosity and depth in learning. The outdoor area in the nursery continues to be developed with literacy and numeracy learning activities in mind and children are engaging well with these opportunities, furthering the development of core skills.
