Summary

How people rate the park

Generally the park scores very low, with 7 out of 15 categories rated below average. Top-scoring features are: Accessibility, Adaptability, and Safety. Below average scores were given for: Attractiveness, Community involvement, Biodiversity, Economic benefits, Regulating benefits, Variety and Signage. These indicate the themes that currently work well and those that could be significantly improved.

What people like about the park as it is

The most popular elements of the existing park are the location of the park near to participants' homes, the playpark and the open space.

What people don't like / issues raised

The main, overriding issue is the lack of variety – in the playpark and the space as a whole. Seating, litter/dog fouling and lack of planting also featured quite highly.

Recommendations for action – based on all information collected

The park generally scores low and key issues need to be addressed in the short and long-term. By analysing all the information collated, including that from officers and local residents, recommended actions for improving the park are:

- 1) Review play equipment and assess potential of outdoor gym equipment
- 2) Addition of more plants
- 3) Addition of seating / bins
- 4) Addition of entrance signage
- 5) Alternative path to increase accessibility around park

Potential Partners

Suggestions for local partners, who may be able to help with the recommended improvements, include: East Calder Community Council, ECRA, the Primary Schools, youth groups and local businesses.




Introduction

Langton Park was created when the housing estate was built. It is not owned by West Lothian Council, but the playpark, paths, lighting, grass and shrubs are all adopted for maintenance by the council. The park is designated as a Local Park in the West Lothian Open Space Plan and protected as open space in the West Lothian Local Plan (2018).

Langton Park is an irregularly shaped, small park, approximately 0.7ha, completely surrounded by houses. It is situated on a predominantly north-eastern facing slope. It consists of four large areas of grass divided by lit, tarmac paths and a playpark. There are no benches, limited bins and very little planting - with 3/4 trees and one shrub border. It connects with the wider network of open spaces in East Calder via the main pedestrian walkway to the north.

As the council maintains the park, money has been allocated through the Open Space Capital Programme to make improvements to the park in 2021/22. Feedback from local stakeholders will inform the immediate improvements and help to shape a longer-term vision for the park.



Information gathering

Feedback from local stakeholders was gathered via an online survey. The survey period ran from 9th to 30th November 2020.

Emails were sent to all known stakeholders, including East Calder Community Council, local Councillors and council officers. 50 fliers advertising the survey were put through neighbours' doors around the park, and 6 posters were displayed in and around the park. The survey was also advertised through the council's Media team. A total of 43 local people gave their feedback altogether.

Feedback

From Council officers:

- There is potential to increase canopy cover in this park through either planting small copses or 'specimen' trees.
- The timber retaining wall at the playpark was recently replaced at a cost of £9,000. No further Play Capital is planned until 2025.

From survey:

Name of the park

Almost all participants call the park Langton Park, with one or two calling it Langton or The Park.

Rate the Place

Participants were asked to rate the park as it currently is, using the council's Park Audit questionnaire. The results are shown in the chart below. 42 people participated in scoring the park.



With a possible top score of 5 points for each category, it can be seen that only 3 park categories score above average: Accessibility, Adaptability and Safety.

Roughly average scores are given for: Quality of materials, Network with wider area, Entrance/boundaries and Maintenance.

All the other categories are below average: Attractiveness, Community involvement, Biodiversity, Regulating benefits, Variety and Signage, with Economic benefits having the lowest score.

These scores give us a clear indication of which themes within the park work well and which themes could be significantly improved.

The park's average community-rated score is 33, which rates below 'fit for purpose' (40 being the cut-off point). This is the same score as rated through the council's park audit process.

Please see Appendix 1 for a more detailed description of the characteristics that were scored.

What do people like best about the park?

When the feedback for this question is pasted into a 'word cloud generator', the resulting size of each word shows how often it is mentioned. The 'word cloud' for Langton Park is shown here, allowing us to see at a glance which elements of the park are currently most valued:



Mostly, people like that the park is near their homes. The playpark and the open space are appreciated, followed by accessibility, the location of the park away from traffic and that children can play there.



What people don't like / issues people raised

The most common issue is the equipment in the playpark. This is followed by lack of seating and a general lack of variety in the park. Litter and dog fouling featured quite highly along with a lack of planting. Some people mentioned issues with young people at the playpark, access and maintenance.





Suggestions for improvements

The most popular suggestion for short term, low-cost improvements to the park is to add more play equipment (although not particularly low cost). This is followed by planting, seating, maintenance and bins. Some people also suggested signage, fencing, access, lighting, an outdoor gym and more variety in general.

The most popular suggestion for longer-term improvements is to increase the variety of equipment in the playpark. This was followed by increasing variety of things to do in the park overall, seating, planting, maintenance and access. Some people mentioned bins, lighting, the hill and landscaping.

All suggestions can be viewed in Appendix 2 at the end of this report.



Recommendations

The park generally scores low and key issues need to be addressed in the short and long-term. By analysing all the information collated, including that from officers and local residents, recommended actions for improving the park are:

- 1) Review play equipment and assess potential of outdoor gym equipment
- 2) Addition of more plants
- 3) Addition of seating / bins
- 4) Addition of entrance signage
- 5) Alternative paths to increase accessibility around park

The playpark has recently had work done to improve safety (replacing the timber retaining wall) and is not due for any further investment until 2025. The suggestions for play equipment will be used to inform future investment.

Additional planting will help to boost the park scores for Attractiveness, Biodiversity and Regulating benefits – this could be trees, shrubs and/or perennial plants such as bulbs. Incorporating some edible plants (e.g. fruit trees) in the general planting of the park would help to boost the park score for Economic benefits and increase the Variety of things to do in the park as well.

A few seats will allow people to relax in the park, watch children at the playpark and take a rest when going up the hill.

Entrance signage will help to give the park an identity, and a couple of extra paths in the park, to link up the paths going through the park, would give the park a better design structure and enable alternative routes for park users. A measured walk could also be incorporated to encourage people to exercise.

To improve community involvement in the park, local residents could organise small events (e.g. guided walks, Easter Egg hunts, etc) or practical projects such as planting days, litter picks, etc. Or by fundraising for public art, for example. This can either be done through the Community Council or a dedicated Friends of the Park group, which the council is happy to help support.

Lighting was suggested by a few local residents, however there is already lighting on all the paths within the park.

Appendix 1 – Rate the Place characteristics explained

No.	Measure	Some things to consider 'yes' answers = higher score, unless stated
1	Attractiveness	Is the park generally attractive? Does it have a consistent or unique character?
2	Community	Does the community help to make decisions about the park? Are there frequent community events? Is there evidence of community involvement?
3	Quality	Are features and facilities robust and long-lasting?
4	Sustainability	Is weedkiller used in maintenance? (lower score) Is every bit of grass cut short? (lower) Recycling bins on site? Are there signs that materials / resources are reused on site? (e.g. grass clippings on shrub-beds)
5	Adaptability	Could spaces within the park be changed easily to suit different uses over time?
6	Biodiversity	Are there different shapes, sizes and types of plants within the park? Do you regularly see different insects / birds / other animals in the park?
7	Economic benefits	Does anyone charge for activities or events here? Does anyone sell things here? Do people collect wood or berries? Do people fish? Do people grow food here?
8	Network	Is the park connected to other green areas nearby, or rivers/burns? Is it connected to walking/cycle paths?
9	Regulating benefits	Are there trees / shrubs / plants at different heights? (to filter air/water, soak up rainfall and store carbon) Are there areas that visibly hold water when it rains? Are there flowers to support bees and other pollinators?
10	Variety	Is there a good variety of things to do in the park? e.g. sport/ walk/ sit/ learn/ play/ watch wildlife / picnic/ cycle/ eat/ run / climb / socialise / walk dog / good views
11	Accessibility	Is the park easy to walk to and get around? Is most of the park accessible to buggies / wheelchairs?
12	Entrances / boundaries	Do you know you're in a park? Are entrances and boundaries well defined? Are they attractive?
13	Maintenance	Is the park well-maintained? Is there much litter, vandalism or areas of neglect? (lower)
14	Signage	Is it clear who looks after the park and how to contact them? Is there any information on wildlife/ history, etc?
15	Safety	Do children and older people regularly use the park? Can you see across the park? Are there areas that feel unsafe? (lower)

Young people

Access
