About our school

Deans Community High School are pleased to share progress made in Session 2015/16 with parents and the wider community. The school enjoyed a very successful year following a very full programme. There is good evidence of continuous improvement and attainment has continued to improve. The school have worked hard on ensuring that developments meet the needs of the 21st Century in line with Curriculum for Excellence.

What we planned to improve last year?

Area for development 1

To develop a wider, more flexible curriculum, offering greater opportunities for students to gain a range of qualifications and develop skills for work.

Area for development 2

To develop opportunities for students to influence the teaching and learning taking place throughout the school and to work with partners in developing a new work experience model.

How well did we do in 2014/15?

Priority 1

We have made good progress.

Last session saw us bringing together the results of the previous year's consultations and using them to build a senior phase curriculum that offered more opportunities for students as they moved onto the qualification stage of their education. This included a wider range of additional courses that students from S4 to S6 could choose alongside the courses they opted to study in school. The number of qualifications S4 students could choose was reduced to 6, allowing them to deepen their understanding of each of their chosen subjects. All students in S4, 5 and 6 were given access to wider achievement options which they could select alongside the more traditional subject choices, allowing them to develop a wider range of skills.

Priority 2

We have made good progress.

We are keen for students at Deans to have their say in what takes place both within their classroom and across the wider school. Their views were asked for in a number of subject areas, including PE and Science. Students led improvement groups and fed back their opinions to staff and other students, along with details of changes that took place as a result of this, such as different sports being taught in PE.

The student council made a request for blazers to be introduced and made decisions on the colour, styles and supplier of the final product.

A different approach to work experience was introduced. Students who were aiming to leave school and seek jobs were given the opportunity to work with an employer in an area that interested them.

Students across the school were involved in developing their employability skills through enterprise days, employability days and industry visits.
