

#### New £5.8 million extension delivers enhanced facilities at Pinewood

Primary School and Early Learning Centre in Winchburgh.



More and better facilities are available for pupils at Pinewood School in Blackburn, following the completion of a superb new £5.8 million extension.

An official opening was held for the impressive new extension, which includes a games hall, dining spaces, additional classrooms and

Pinewood delivers quality primary and secondary education for young people with complex needs from across West Lothian. The extension is the third to the school in recent years, and will deliver significant improvements to the learning environment for pupils and staff.

The works, which included demolishing the original block as well as external environmental improvements, are part of a major £26.5 million investment programme in schools for pupils

with additional support needs across West Lothian.

To mark the completion of the extension, an opening ceremony was held for school pupils and invited guests, featuring music from Pinewood pupils.

Officially opening the extension, Depute Leader of West Lothian Council Kirsteen Sullivan said: "I'm delighted to see work completed on this fantastic new £5.8 million extension for Pinewood.

"I'm sure the enhanced facilities will make a real, positive difference in the educational experience for Pinewood pupils for many years to come."

#### Additional year of nursery

All West Lothian children who have not turned five by the start of the school year will now be entitled to an additional year of early learning and childcare (ELC).

Education Executive have approved revised policies that will ensure parents/carers of eligible children can decide to defer starting Primary one for an extra year.

Previously, only children with a January or February birth date who would be four at the start of Primary one had the right to an automatic deferral. Parents/carers of children born between August and December could apply for an additional year of ELC if they wished, with every request received in the last two years granted.

The policy change will bring the council into line with Scottish Government legislation that confirms the right to an additional year of funded ELC for pupils from August 2023.

#### Step forward for new East Calder Primary School

Plans to deliver the replacement East Calder Primary School have been approved.



Council Executive gave their backing to proposals which would see construction start on the new school in April 2023.

Due to rising construction costs,

a fixed price of £18.3 million has been agreed to remove additional financial risks.

The current East Calder Primary School building is not suitable for the future delivery of high-quality education due to a number of issues including suitability, accessibility and sustainability.

The plans will see a new school constructed adjacent to the existing school in Langton Road, East Calder, with the recently built Early Years extension

Once complete in 2024, pupils will move over to the new building and the current school will be demolished.



"I'm delighted that work is set to start on a superb new East Calder Primary School soon. We are committed to delivering the best possible platform for education for children in West Lothian by continually improving our school estate. Educational attainment has been rising consistently for the last decade in West Lothian, and making sure we have buildings suitable for learning is a key part of this. In a challenging and

volatile construction market, agreeing a fixed price of £18.3 million for the new school provides certainty for the council and the local community going forward."

# Change a life by becoming a foster carer

There is an urgent need in West Lothian for foster carers to care for our children and young people. We need caring and committed local people to fill a variety of fostering roles which will help make an immeasurable difference to the life of a young person up until the age of 21 years old.

#### Who can foster?

We welcome single people and couples regardless of your gender, sexuality or ethnic background.

#### **How much space** do I need?

You must have a spare room and enough space for the children you foster.

#### Are there age restrictions?

Yes, you must be aged 21 years or over.

#### What about training?

All prospective foster carers must be available for assessment, and must attend the pre-approval training course. Once you are a foster carer you will receive ongoing support.

#### What happens if I have a pet?

Pets are welcome and can bring many positive experiences. Your pet will be assessed as part of the process.

#### Are smokers allowed to foster?

If you are a smoker, we will only approve you to foster children aged five-years and over.

## Spotlight on: Road repairs

#### On average West Lothian Council carries out 210 pothole repairs each month.

#### Why do potholes occur?

Very cold weather does result in more potholes. The RAC recently said that the weather in January 2023 was the perfect recipe for potholes on roads – which is as a result of heavy rain and freezing temperatures.

Jim Jack, the council's Head of Operational Services said:

"Water will find its way into any cracks in the road surface. If this freezes, the ice formed will put pressure on the road surface, forcing the cracks open. When the ice thaws the gap left is a weak spot, which can become a pothole as traffic runs over the area. This winter we experienced a cold snap before Christmas, followed by very wet weather and another cold period. These combined are the worst conditions we could experience in terms of the road condition."

"To put this into context, our team has

repaired around 700 potholes in January 2023 alone, compared to our normal workload of around 210 per month.

"Despite the extremely challenging financial position that the council faces, our road network overall is in good condition in West Lothian, and we continue to work to maintain that."

#### How are they fixed?

"Our primary concern with potholes is to ensure that the road network is safe and every defect is inspected and a risk assessment is carried out to determine the response time required for a repair. For high risk defects this means that we will infill potholes within 24 hours of the defect being recorded and we will return at a later date to undertake permanent repairs if reauired.

"More often than not, our team will put in place a temporary patch. This ensures that the roads are safe in the short term.

and reduces the damage done to vehicles. Our team will return soon afterwards to undertake a full and permanent repair if that is required. This can involve traffic management or even temporary closures so a patch is helpful to both ourselves and motorists as it prevents having to close roads completely whilst we schedule in permanent repairs.

"Our safety inspection programme is ongoing and we also respond to all reports of road defects.

"We have dedicated teams working to infill potholes at all times. Generally speaking potholes assessed as lower risk can be infilled within five working days although some may take longer due to the circumstances of the repair."

#### **What can** customers do to help?

We would encourage people to use the web form on the council's website to report any potholes or other road defects. Potholes and road defects can be reported by scanning the QR code or visiting www.westlothian.gov.uk/report

## Ecology F&Biodiversity

The council's Ecology and Biodiversity Team has been in place for 18 months now.

The team's core work is split between strategic planning and policy – an overview of biodiversity across West Lothian projects - making physical changes to the landscape; and advisory and advocacy working with others.

#### Here's just a little snapshot of what the team have been getting up to over the past year:

- Mapped all the habitats throughout West Lothian, to help inform a new Local Biodiversity Action Plan (LBAP).
- Planted over 7,500 trees in partnership with Green Action Trust, Edinburgh and Lothians Greenspace Trust (ELGT) schools and community groups.
- Created an overall strategy for ecological grassland management in council open
- Provided ecological input into numerous planning applications.

- Helped to shape national biodiversity policies and frameworks.
- Organised free, summertime buglife workshops for the public.
- Helped colleagues to protect and enhance biodiversity.
- Set up the Tree Time initiative with ELGT, to enable more tree planting across West Lothian.

#### And much, much more!

Our main priority this year is to produce a new LBAP for West Lothian. This will ensure that all biodiversity-related work is 'joined up' and will enable us to identify and create nature networks across the area. As much of West Lothian's land isn't owned by the council, we're building up contacts with other landowners / managers interested in the West Lothian LBAP - we would very much appreciate the input, and contributing to a wider plan may help others to secure different accreditations and grants too.

#### Volunteering opportunities



**West Lothian Council Ranger** Service has a wide range of volunteering opportunities available for 2023 at sites across West Lothian, including the three Country Parks and wider Nature Parks and green spaces.

The Volunteer Ranger Service sessions run twice a month and take place at different sites across West Lothian.

These sessions are sometimes run in partnership with 'Friends' groups for different sites, and tasks include vegetation management, path work, meadow management and tree care.

The Ranger Service continue to work with the Friends of Polkemmet Country Park, Friends of Almondell & Calderwood Country Park, Friends of Little Boghead and Friends of the Blackmoss groups, and additional volunteering sessions will be held at these locations in 2023. In addition to this, the Ranger Service will be starting up the 'Friends of Beecraigs and Witchcraig' group, who will help to manage areas of Beecraigs Country Park

#### What's been happening in West Lothian's Country Parks?

## **Beecraigs Country Park**

Path improvement works to surface part of the Orange waymarked route have now been completed, and work is ongoing to surface sections of the purple waymarked route, in partnership with several volunteer groups to address erosion and drainage issues on both routes.

**Geology interpretation panels** and an interactive board have been installed next to the Geology Seat at the back of the Visitor Centre. These are designed to give context to the important underlying geology of the Bathgate Hills, whilst visitors enjoy the view across the Forth.

The new Witchcraig link path is being widely used by visitors. This path links Beecraigs to Witchcraig and the Korean War Memorial, and provides onward travel into the Bathgate Hills.

#### Almondell & Calderwood **Country Park**

The walled-garden project, grant-aided by Heritage Fund, is almost complete. The project has involved the restoration of the wall, the delivery of educational sessions to local schools and will finish with the installation of an interactive unit within the Visitor

Through the fund, the Friends of Almondell & Calderwood have been involved in the design and installation of a Community Heritage Trail, with panels providing a historical timeline of events, and insight into Almondell's rich history. Heritage Trail leaflets are available in the Visitor Centre.

#### **Polkemmet Country Park**

The Friends of Polkemmet continue to carry out important maintenance and conservation work in the Park, in partnership with the Ranger Service and Polkemmet parkrun, who have recently been helping to maintain their running route during the monthly Friends of Polkemmet volunteer sessions

With the help of several volunteer groups, some areas of the river bank along the Blue waymarked route have been reinforced using willow spiling, a method which creates a woven 'living bank', that helps to strengthen the sides of the river bank and mitigate the effects of erosion.

## Your guide to the council's budget

- The council has agreed budgets for the year ahead and a financial plan for the next five years.
- The council's budget helps to deliver local services.
- The financial plan will allow us to balance our budget and bridge an estimated £39.4 million budget gap over the next five years.





#### Revenue

The Revenue budget covers the council's day-to-day spend and includes the cost of running services.

The council's Revenue budget will invest over £525 million to deliver day-to-day local services in 2023/24.



#### **Capital**

Capital funding is one-off amounts of funding that are used to create new assets and improve existing assets. Assets include school buildings, play parks, roads. This also includes one-off investment to extend schools or build new schools.

The council will invest a further £280 million in capital projects such as parks, roads, property maintenance.



#### Housing (Revenue and Capital)

The council will invest further in council housing. This includes the day-to-day investment in managing housing services and also one-off investment in improving housing services – such as the creation of new council homes.



**Council Tax** 

A Council Tax increase of 5.8% for all bands has been approved for 2023/24, which is below the current rate of inflation. Council Tax rates in West Lothian will remain below the Scottish average. The 5.8% increase will generate income of £5.431 million in 2023/24 that will be spent on delivering, protecting and improving local services in West Lothian and will help to prevent a number of proposed service savings measures being implemented.




#### Why does the council have a budget gap?

The economic climate over the next few years will continue to be extremely challenging.

#### The council have significant and sustained budget pressures caused by Increasing costs and a growing population.

These are combined with insufficient levels of Scottish Government grant funding. Our grant from the Government is expected to be less than required to deliver essential local services. This results in a budget gap.



#### What is the budget gap?

Over the next five years the council estimate that they will have to make savings of approximately £39.4 million pounds with £15.5 million of savings required in 2023/24.

#### West Lothian's increasing costs explained

- Over the next 25 years West Lothian is forecast to have the fastest growth in population of pensionable age in Scotland with an increase of 44% twice the Scottish average.
- West Lothian's older population (aged over 65) is set to rise by nearly a third between 2018 and 2028.
- West Lothian's school age population continues to require significant investment in additional education infrastructure to meet demand
- products such as increasing energy and fuel costs that are required to run local services.

### Other increasing costs come from

### West Lothian's insufficient levels of funding

The Scottish Government provides the council with around 80% of its budget and the grant from the Government is expected to be less than required for the council to deliver essential local services. This results in a budget gap and changes to local services and cost savings are therefore required.

#### Making changes to local services and becoming more sustainable

The council is legally required to balance its budget – therefore the council must reduce spending and change some local services.

A number of budget saving measures have been approved which will allow the council to balance its budget. Savings measures overall will be implemented over the next five years with some measures being implemented from April 2023.

#### Approved budget saving measures include these examples:

- Considering where numbers of community centres could be reduced with minimum impact on local communities.
- Removal of the concessionary rail scheme.
- Closure of the animal attraction at Beecraigs Country Park.
- Reduced winter maintenance service whilst maintaining the statutory obligations.
- All Community Recycling Centres (CRCs) sites will remain open but revised opening hours will be implemented.
- Changes and reductions to management structures and internal workforce changes
- Reduction in energy savings (heating., renewables and swimming pools).
- Closure of some public toilets and other property budget savings.

#### Council Tax

explained

Council Tax contributes towards providing local services. Whist it is important, it accounts for 20% of our total budget and is not our main source of funding. 80% of our funding is given to us directly from the Scottish Government.

#### How is the council funded?

- Council Tax itself accounts for around **20%** of our total funding.
- 80% of the council's funding comes from the Scottish Government.

80% 20%

- Council Tax has been increased for all bands in 2023/24 by 5.8%.
- Council Tax helps to pay for local services but it does not pay for all local services. Council Tax will help generate funding and 100% of the funding generated by Council Tax is invested in local services.
- If Council Tax did not increase, less funding would be generated and less money would be spent on local services.

Our current estimates take into account that an estimated 900 new homes will be built each year - providing additional income over the next five years.

That additional income will help to fund the additional cost associated with new homes such as demand for local schools, roads, waste services and local facilities.



The Council Tax Reduction Scheme (CTRS) is in place to help those on a low income pay all or part of their Council Tax. Any increase in Council Tax will fully offset by an increase in CTRS. To ensure any increases in Council Tax do not regularly impact on low-income households, CTRS continues to be actively promoted.

- West Lothian had the tenth lowest Council Tax band D rate in Scotland compared with all other Scottish councils 2022/23
- The Scottish average band D Council Tax is higher than the West Lothian band D rate





## Investing in West Lothian

Millions invested in West Lothian schools, roads and open spaces

### West Lothian Council will invest an estimated £280 million over the next 10 years in capital investment projects.

To help inform this programme of improvement work, a full review of the council's assets has been carried out to ensure the funding is spent in priority areas. In addition to agreeing a revenue budget – which is essentially our day-to-day running costs – West Lothian Council has agreed a new 10-year Capital Programme and Asset Management Strategy.

Our Capital Programme is used to improve local assets – which are essentially buildings, parks and roads. It also includes one-off investment for facilities such as new schools or extensions. Capital investment helps supports the delivery of essential day-to-day services.





#### Investment from our Capital Programme is split into four main areas:

#### **Property**

#### A total of £165.7 million will be invested in property, with the majority spent improving and maintaining West Lothian's school estate to ensure it remains one of the best in the country.

West Lothian Council currently has a property portfolio of over 1,000 properties including 267 operational properties such as schools, partnership centres and properties operated by West Lothian Leisure.

We also own 738 Non-Operational Properties – which are properties that are used to stimulate economic growth and can be rented from the council. These include shop and storage facilities.

Next year alone, the council's capital programme will include planned improvements at various schools including St John the Baptist; Fauldhouse; St John Ogilvie, Livingston; Springfield Primary; Linlithgow and Eastertoun Primary; Armadale.

#### £165.7 million



The funding will also pay for the construction of a new East Calder Primary, a new Beatlie School, and significant projects at Knightsridge Primary, Balbardie, Windyknowe and Our Lady's Stoneyburn.

Other major capital investments by the council include: roof replacement work at Whitburn Community Centre and the Lanthorn Community Centre in Livingston; the Cawburn Complex Care Development in Pumpherston, and a proposed new Single Person Homeless Accommodation and Assessment Centre.

#### **Open Spaces**

#### £28.4 million

£28.4 million will be invested in open spaces, which includes £6 million for children's play areas and £1.4 million for synthetic pitches. Refurbishment and improvement works at cemeteries and sports facilities will also see significant investment.

#### Information and communication technology (ICT)

#### £22 million

£22 million will be invested in ICT to support essential services.

The council owns and uses a significant range of ICT assets including: communications lines and network equipment, and 27,000 devices including laptops, desktops, smart devices – including devices for school pupils.



#### Roads and paths

#### £64.5 million

£64.5 million will be invested in roads and related assets, which includes nearly £4 million for town centre and villages improvement.

These are the council's largest assets and include bridges, street lighting, flood prevention and road casualty reduction schemes.

The 10-year strategy covers a huge amount of road improvements. In 2023/24 the capital investment programme includes significant upgrade projects on: the A71 Lizzie Bryce Roundabout, A771 Newpark Roundabout and A89 Mossbank to Dechmont.

Many more road and infrastructure projects such as road-casualty reduction schemes, and cycling and walking routes are also planned.





The Housing Capital Investment Programme for 2023/24 to 2027/28 has been approved alongside the approval of the Housing Revenue Account Budget covering the same period.

- £27.2 million is to be invested in the creation and acquisition of homes with 380 new council homes set to be delivered from 2022/23 to 2027/28. The council will also continue to work alongside Registered Social Landlords to expand the local housing supply.
- £30.5 million is to be invested across 15 individual projects over the period from 2023/24 to 2027/28. These projects will be a variety of Major Elemental Upgrades consisting of long-term maintenance work, such as roof and external wall repairs.
- Planned programme works to the value of £43.7
  million are anticipated to be taking place over the
  budget period. The works will cover a broad range of
  activities, including kitchens and bathroom
  replacements, window and door refurbishments,
  painting and fencing programmes.
- Work to the value of £1.5 million, will continue on general environmental improvements and external upgrading, including tenant-led street improvement projects.

## Nearly **£54** million



will be invested to improve and maintain existing housing, ensuring council homes continue to meet the Scottish Housing Quality Standard (SHQS). Much of this work will involve projects designed to deliver energy, efficiency measures, such as central heating replacements, external wall insulation upgrades, electrical testing and repairs.

An annual rent increase of 3.5% each year from 2023/24 to 2027/28 has been approved as part of the Housing Revenue Account Budget. This will help ensure continued investment in council housing infrastructure, improving existing homes and creating new affordable homes.

This decision has been informed following consultation with the tenants with nearly three-quarters of tenants who responded expressing a preference for a 3.5% per annum rent increase over the five-year period.

#### **Executive councillor for housing services, George Paul, said:**

West Lothian Council continues to invest in providing a high-quality social housing service for local people that is responsive to customers' needs. Every penny of rent collected is invested into the delivery of affordable housing in West Lothian, and maintaining and improving existing council homes. The budget features a strong focus on increasing the energy efficiency of existing housing stock and infrastructure. This will hopefully help to reduce the energy bills of council tenants and make homes more environmentally friendly.

## Social housing in West Lothian



The council's Eagle Brae development in Livingston features 29 homes. The site at Deans South also features 29 new homes.

The first phase of this project has been completed. At the time of writing, work is nearing completion on the renovation of the former Newlands House in Bathgate. The works at Hopetoun Street will see the creation of four self-contained flats.





Anyone who is homeless or is threatened with homelessness can contact the West Lothian Council Housing Options Service to discuss all the potential options available to them in terms of accommodation and support. Once the needs of an applicant have been identified, the

Housing Options team will provide support and advice to access all types of housing, including social housing, private housing and help to apply/find a deposit if required. All types of social housing in West Lothian are currently in very high demand and as a result, all current applicants for social housing in West Lothian are also strongly encouraged to ensure that they register not just with the council, but with all Registered Social Landlords who operate in West Lothian

### NEW HOMES PLAN FOR WEST LOTHIAN APPROVED

An ambitious new plan is bidding to support the delivery of over 2,800 new affordable homes for rent.









The council has approved a new Strategic Housing Investment Plan (SHIP) for 2023/24 to 2027/28 to deliver more affordable homes for rent in West Lothian.

The SHIP is the strategic bidding document for investing in affordable housing for rent for West Lothian, which the council then submits to the Scottish Government for grant funding.

The approved SHIP includes proposals for up to 2,811 new homes on a wide range of sites, which then informs the affordable housing programme.

These include potential sites for up to 508 new council homes with 1,965 new homes from Registered Social Landlord (RSL) partners, as well as new sites yet to be allocated for development. The council also expects to buy 50 houses on the open market, with RSL partners aiming to purchase a further 15.

In the last 10 years, the council and RSL partners have successfully delivered over 3,000 additional affordable homes for rent across West Lothian.



"I'm delighted that West Lothian continues to be one of the leading areas in Scotland for delivering new affordable homes for rent. The West Lothian SHIP for the next five years will see the council and our RSL partners pushing as far as we can to deliver

the maximum number of homes that our financial resources allow. We appreciate that demand for these new homes outstrips what we are able to deliver, but we hope to help as many local families as possible."

#### **Young Persons Free Bus Travel Scheme**

If you are 5-21 years old and live in Scotland then you are eligible for free public bus travel.

To travel free on the public bus network, you must have a new National Entitlement Card (NEC) or Young Scot National Entitlement Card (Young Scot NEC) that was issued to you after 10 January 2022.

Children aged under 5 years do not need to apply for a card as they already travel for free on public bus services across Scotland.

The application process is different depending on

This is because, as well as travel, they are eligible to have a Young Scot NEC that provides access to a number of other discounts. West Lothian Council has redeveloped the site at East Main Street to create a new Partnership Centre at the heart of Whitburn. The original Burgh Halls façade has been kept and restored and a new two-storey extension has been added to the retained East Mains Street building.

creating multi-purpose facilities, bringing services together to benefit local communities whilst delivering financial savings through the reduction of other council buildings.

#### New electric car charges now in place

**New tariffs for West Lothian's** electric vehicle (EV) public charging network were introduced in February 2023.

West Lothian Council owns a total of 32 public charge points at seventeen locations.

There are a number of charge points operated by other organisations, including those located at railway stations.

As the uptake of electric vehicles and the use of council owned facilities has increased, so have

the costs of operating and  $maintaining \ the \ network$ and infrastructure. These costs were met by West Lothian Council, which is not sustainable given the rising cost of electricity.

Introducing charges for council-owned charging points will allow the council to recover the costs of operating the network, and maximise the availability of

rapid chargers by improving driver behaviour.

It will also encourage private investment in the network, further increasing provision of EV charging points in future - which is widely seen as a way to help meet the future growth of electric vehicles and demand for charging points.



#### **Help Address West Lothian's** Links to Colonialism and the Transatlantic Slave Trade

A consultation is to be launched in the near future which will seek the views of local residents on how West Lothian should look to address its past links to the Colonialism and the Transatlantic Slave Trade.

The Legacy of Chattel Slavery Working Group was set up in West Lothian in early 2021. The group's aim is to explore West Lothian's historical links to the transatlantic slave trade and consider the most effective ways to address the past and provide points on education for future generations. This includes tackling instances of modern-day discrimination.

The working group features a range of representative organisations including the Church of Scotland, Fair Justice System for Scotland (FJSS) Group,

Linlithgow Heritage Trust, Scotland Zimbabwe Association, West Lothian Council, and the West Lothian Race

The findings from the upcoming consultation will inform the working group's recommendations and will feature in a report to be brought to Council Executive Committee in 2023. This will help the council decide which actions it will consider and what the priorities for change might be.

The consultation is set to be launched in the near future and will include ways to participate online and in-person. Further details on how you can participate will be made available via the social media platforms of West Lothian Council and FJSS Group.

## Check what you are entitled to

People are being encouraged to check that they are not missing out on financial support that they are entitled.





Support and advice for people is available via West Lothian Council's Advice Shop – who have helped raise over £25 million in benefits, in West Lothian, in 2022.

The Advice Shop is a free, impartial and confidential service to help the people of West Lothian with a focus to alleviate poverty, and to promote inclusion and equality through advice, assistance and advocacy in Welfare

Benefits, Energy Advice, Money and Debt and Housing Advice.

The team dealt with nearly 178,000 individual contacts and enquiries last year, a 22% increase on 2021/22 and supported over 15,300

individual customers.

The council's anti-poverty manager Nahid Hanif said: "The cost of living is affecting many people and what is very important is that those who are entitled to benefits ensure that they are receiving them. Benefits exist to help people who need that extra support and it's clear through our work that many people don't realise that they are entitled to that additional support via benefits.

"It's very clear that many West Lothian residents are not claiming the benefits that they are entitled to going by the £15 billion of benefits that are going unclaimed across the UK. A significant proportion of them will stay in



The Pensioner Income Maximisation Team within the council's Advice Shop is a free, impartial and confidential service to help pensioners with a variety of issues such as Welfare Benefits, Energy Advice, Money and Debt and Housing Advice.

The team has helped local pensioners generate their income by over £10.4 million last year. This is done through carrying out assessments with individuals, advising them on what benefits they are entitled to and helping them apply.

Leader of West Lothian Council Lawrence Fitzpatrick recently met with Alistair MacEachen who has received support from the service.

Cllr Fitzpatrick said: "We know that pensioners on a low income are amongst the most vulnerable group in our society. It's so important that they contact the Advice Shop to ensure that they are not missing out on financial support that they are entitled to.

"Many pensioners can often feel too proud to ask for help and don't see themselves as in need of benefits. However, these benefits are set aside specifically to help and during this time where prices are rising and financial hardship is commonplace, this support might be the difference between heating their home or not. I'd urge local people of pensionable age to contact the Pensioner Income Maximisation Service at the Advice Shop and find out if they are entitled to support."

#### **Unclaimed adult Child Trust Funds**

The latest information from the Money and Pensions Service indicates that the total value of unclaimed adult Child Trust Funds (CTFs) across Scotland is over £80 million.

If you were born in the United Kingdom between 1 September 2002 and 2 January 2011 and your parents/ guardians claims Child Benefit for you you're almost certain to have a Child Trust Fund - money put into a personal account for you by the Government, which could now be worth £1,000 or more. You can take control of it from your 16th birthday, before getting access to the money at 18.

#### £2.3million unclaimed funds on Best Start **Food Cards across** Scotland

People are urged to check their Best Start Foods card for unspent money. Best Start Foods is one of five family payments that provide financial support to families with children under the age of 16.



Further assistance is on the way for West Lothian residents via the low-income winter heating payment. Thirteen thousand people in West Lothian will be automatically paid the new lowincome winter heating payment, with a payment of £50 due to be made from February 2023.


