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Howden Park Centre



West Lothian Leisure (WLL) has requested the council's consent to close four facilities that they currently operate.

They are:

- Broxburn Swimming Pool
- Xcite Armadale
- Xcite Livingston (Bubbles)
- Howden Park Centre, Livingston.

A report recently confirmed that all four facilities currently make a significant monthly financial loss and, if the facilities do not close, WLL faces the risk of insolvency, which would risk the closure of all Xcite facilities.

The four facilities also require significant and immediate sums of capital funding to bring them up to standard. The council's core capital grant has been reduced significantly by the Scottish Government.

As Bulletin went to print, work is underway to explore alternative commercial and community options for running Howden Park Centre, and a number of swimming pools, with other interested parties including key community user groups.

The council has also agreed to provide £20,000 each month until the end of March 2024 to ensure Howden Park Centre remains open, and is able to honour existing bookings. The funding is intended to help ensure a smooth transition to an alternative potential operator.

Leader of West Lothian Council Lawrence Fitzpatrick said: "The council has agreed that one off funding of £20,000 per month from the start of September will be available until the end of March 2024 to support the operation of the centre for the remainder of the financial year.

"This is due to the unique nature of Howden Park in requiring a future programme of events, which had been arranged in advance of WLL's announcement on 3 May that they seek to close Howden Park.

"This will ensure that a full programme of events is maintained and deliver a smooth transition to any potential operator approved following conclusion of the current process of exploring alternative options for running Howden Park Centre."

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Next step towards Historic status for iconic skate park

Over 500 people have taken part in an online survey organised by Historic Environment Scotland (HES) and Skateboard Scotland as part of the process which could see West Lothian Council's Livingston Skatepark granted historic listed status.

West Lothian Council wrote to Historic Environment Scotland asking them to consider listing the park, which was the first of its kind in the UK when opened in 1981.

The survey sought information from people who know and use the skatepark or have a view on its design, history and significance. With the survey now closed, HES will now analyse the feedback from participants to help inform their final decision on whether the park meets criteria for listed status.

This is the first time HES have been asked to list a skatepark and they have received well over 500 responses from people who know and/or use the skatepark or have a view on its design, history and cultural significance.

If HES conclude that the skatepark meets the criteria for designation they will consult with West Lothian Council as the owners and local authority before making a decision.

Executive councillor for the environment & sustainability
Tom Conn said: "Thank you to everyone who engaged in the process to date. The skatepark is a wonderful facility that has served Livingston for many years and it will continue to do so whether historic status is granted or not. The park will continue to serve the local community for generations to come."

West Lothian Council plan to carry some concrete repairs later this year at the park and will invest over £120,000.

Parking nearby:

The council-owned car park located immediately to the northeast of the former Club Earth site has been temporarily leased to the new care home developer for the duration of the construction period. The car park will revert to public use when the construction is complete. Free public car parking is readily available at the nearby Terrace Car Park (off Almondvale Boulevard) and also at two further car parks located off Howden South Road, immediately north of the skate park.

New **cycle training facility** for West Lothian

Budding cyclists from across West Lothian will soon be flocking to a new cycle facility at Crofthead Community Centre.

The new bike training facility aims to allow young people and those with disabilities to learn to ride their bikes in a safe and enclosed environment. The facility will be managed by the Bike Library who will deliver training sessions.

West Lothian Council oversaw the project on behalf of the partnership of the Community Centre Management Committee & WL Bike Library who secured funding through the Scottish Government's Place Based Investment Programme funding.

£350,000 was awarded which funded the creation of the new bike facility, demolition of old buildings and the creation of designs for a new multi-purpose hall.

The new facility was officially opened recently with representatives from various groups in attendance. The facility was opened by

nineteen-year-old Brogan McKerrral who started using the Bike Library as a 13-year-old. Brogan, was a pupil at Cedarbank and is now studying at West Lothian College.

The new facility is perfect for adapted bikes to help assist disabled young people learn to cycle. However, anyone looking for a safe and purpose-built training facility can use it.

The facility is run by West Lothian Bike Library who provide a number of training courses and work closely with local schools, including Cedarbank and Ogilvie Schools, who are both special needs schools.

In partnership with Cycling Scotland, Cycling UK & SEStran GO eBike the Bike Library offers a range of training and services all aimed at promoting Active Travel and Inclusiveness in Cycling.



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Steven Carrie was a long-serving and well-respected employee of Sky at Kirkton Campus, and was only 34 when he died two years ago following a cardiac arrest whilst on a family holiday in The Peak District. Not having quicker access to emergency medical support was a key factor in his passing and that has inspired his family to donate a defibrillator for community use at Crofthead Community Centre in Templar Rise, Livingston.

A defibrillator is a device that gives a high energy electric shock to the heart of someone who is in cardiac arrest. This high energy shock is called defibrillation, and it's an essential part in trying to save the life of someone who's in cardiac arrest. A defibrillator may also be called a defib.

Mr Carrie's family unveiled the new defibrillator at Crofthead.

In a poignant gesture, the defibrillator is located in sight of the family's former home in Templar Rise, where Steven lived growing up for 20 years, and can be seen from his former bedroom.

The family simply want to ensure that emergency help is on hand should somebody need it in future.

The family has worked with West Lothian Council to install the life saving device and ensure that it is easy to access should it be needed in an emergency. The council has ensured the defib is easy to access, with lighting installed above the defibrillator, the power supply to the cabinet in place and the area in front of the defib is now concreted. The council is also undertaking work to ensure all defibrillators in West Lothian are promoted via national websites, such as the British Heart Foundation.

The management committee have registered the defib at Crofthead with the appropriate body so it is registered and can be found online.

Andrew Carrie, Steven's dad, explains: "We are absolutely delighted that the defibrillator has been installed in tribute to Steven.

"Whilst it's dedicated in honour of Steven's memory, it has a very real purpose and it is there to be used by someone in need. Even if it only helps one person, it will be worth having it installed.

"i'd like to thank the council and management committee for their support in helping us make this possible. I would also like to acknowledge Steven's former employer, Sky, as they too have been amazing."

Flood improvement works in Bathgate

Works have taken place to reduce the risk of flooding in areas of Bathgate.

Bathgate Cemetery was one of the areas impacted by recent floods in December 2022. The report noted that was due to a combination of both out of bank flows from the burn near the cemetery and the accumulation of surface water runoff from higher areas of ground within the cemetery.

Works are currently underway within the cemetery to mitigate the risk of flooding from the nearby burn and are due to be completed by the end of March.

Elements of the ongoing Bathgate Meadows Nature Park Project will also be looked at in relation to further reducing chances of floods taking place.

Bathgate Meadows is an on-going project which seeks to improve the amenity and environmental benefits of the watercourse and catchment. Following the recent flood in Meadow Park, issues regarding water quality, flooding and the performance of the flood lagoons will be given further consideration as the design of Bathgate Meadows Nature Park is further developed.



"Work has taken place to try and ensure these areas of Bathgate don't succumb to flooding in the future. The Bathgate Meadows Nature Park Project aims to

provide additional benefits to the local environment in addition to additional flood protection. Officers will continue to monitor the risk of flooding in the Bathgate area through routine flood risk management."

New SMART bins are TRANSFORMING LITTER COLLECTION in West Lothian.

West Lothian Council introduced 72 SMART bins last year - otherwise known as solar compactor bins.



Why?

After an initial one-off investment of £32,000 the SMART bins are set to deliver a saving of £24,000 per year due to the improved efficiency of the collection schedule and reduction in visits.

The bins are designed to last for many years which will result in a significant cost saving overall.

compared to a standard public The bins hold more rubbish than standard bins and stop animals getting in and spreading litter about.

Each bin is equipped with a sensor which

provides real time updates to operatives meaning a bin is only emptied when required. Council staff do not therefore have to make unnecessary routine journeys to empty 'normal' bins that are only part

full or nearly empty – this results in a significant cost saving for the council and makes sure the public purse goes further. All SMART bins have been sighted in locations where normal litter bins were emptied daily and, on some occasions, multiple times per day. These locations will be monitored and bins can be moved if

they are not being used to the best of their capacity and another location is suitable.



"The bins were introduced as part of trial and have been a great success to date. An example can be seen in the Linlithgow area where 21 standard bins were replaced with 8 SMART bins around Linlithgow Loch. Not only has the overall bin capacity increased around the Loch but we've reduced the number of times staff have to empty the bins. By

not having to visit all bins to check if they need emptied, staff are able to concentrate on carrying out additional street cleansing duties which should bring overall improvements to the appearance of areas. By having a closed lid, the potential of litter being accessed and spread around by animals is also significantly reduced."

West Lothian's push for Inclusive Play

West Lothian Council has upgraded a number of local play areas with the aim of increasing the amount of facilities, play equipment and access routes that can be used by children with disabilities.

Huge progress has been made in recent years and this work is still ongoing, with more and more inclusive play equipment and infrastructure being installed each year. Most of the council's play areas throughout West Lothian now include equipment which is inclusive.

Wiktoria Cook, Open Space Officer, West Lothian Council said:. "We've been working closely with suppliers, contractors and the community to improve inclusive play value in appropriate locations. This includes educating ourselves about the conditions children face, how we can design with them and their parents and carers in mind and researching how the issue has been approached across the world. The Council hopes to maintain varied and exciting play opportunities for all children across West Lothian."

Most recently, the council has invested around £165,000 on projects to increase inclusive play in West Lothian's Open Spaces. This includes the following projects:

Eliburn Park, Livingston - The existing wheelchair swing has been added to with an accessible trampoline, roundabout and a reactions game panel. The works were completed in March 2023. An accessible route has also been started, featuring ground graphics of wildlife that can be found in the park.

Watson Park, Armadale - A new wheelchair roundabout and a sensory 'hide and seek' path have been added as part of wider park improvements. The new design is inspired by the mature avenue of cherry blossoms which helps bring out the unique character of the park. The park now boasts a more accessible car park and path network, accessible graphics games area, as well as bespoke furniture and signage.

Polkemmet Country Park,

Whitburn - A new wheelchair accessible roundabout, inclusive swing, sensory play panels and wheelchair accessible musical equipment will be installed over June 2023. The designs will tie into the natural surroundings of the Country Park and help create a destination day out for all. Upgraded paths will help support inclusive access through the play area.

Through this recent work, the majority of the council's play areas throughout West Lothian now include equipment which is inclusive.

- Eastfield Park Play Area, Fauldhouse
- West Burngrange Play Area, West Calder
- Redhouse Place Green, Blackburn
- Eliburn Play Area, Livingston
- Mosswood Community Centre, Livingston

- Watson Park in Armadale
- Polkemmet Country Park

Tom Conn, Executive councillor for the Environment and Sustainability said: "We're very proud of the work and commitment that has been focussed on improving West Lothian's parks - making them more inclusive for all children. Despite the significant financial challenges that we face and the hard decisions that we've been forced to make, the council has still been able to invest and improve local facilities in West Lothian, and there are not many projects that demonstrate this better."





New £18.3 million West Lothian primary school underway

Work to deliver a state-of-the-art primary school in West Lothian has started.

Construction is progressing on a superb new £18.3 million East Calder Primary School, to replace the existing school building which is not suitable for the future delivery of high-quality education.

The ambitious project is being funded through the Learning Estate Investment Programme (LEIP), a partnership between Scottish and Local Government to invest in facilities for education which is managed by infrastructure body, the Scottish Futures Trust. To mark the start of the joint project, West Lothian Council's Executive councillor for education Andrew McGuire was joined by Minister for Children and Young People Natalie Don MSP for a special sod-cutting ceremony.

Councillor McGuire said: "I'm delighted to see work starting on a fantastic new East Calder Primary School, which will be hugely welcomed by the local community.

"West Lothian already has one of the top-rated school estates in the country, and the superb new East Calder Primary will help ensure that even more of our children have the best possible platform for education."

Minister for Children and Young People Natalie Don said: "The new East Calder Primary School will feature high quality, up-to-date

facilities that parents, staff and pupils can be proud of, and I am very pleased to be here to break the first ground.

"The Scottish Government's Learning Estate Investment Programme will invest £2 billion in Scottish schools, in partnership with local authorities, ensuring many of our young people are learning in the schools of the

The project is being delivered on behalf of the council by Hub South East with Morrison Construction as the main contractor. This is the

same partnership that recently delivered the new multi-school Winchburgh development. West Calder High School and Calderwood Primary in East Calder.

The replacement school is being built next to the existing school in Langton Road and will be completed by August 2024. The existing school will then be demolished, with the exception of recently-built Early Years extension, which is being retained.



Primary children in West Lothian are achieving above the national average in literacy and numeracy.

The publication of the Curriculum for Excellence (CfE) Levels for 2021/22 puts West Lothian pupils above the Scottish average in all 20 of the national measurements.

By Primary 7, 81% of pupils in West Lothian were achieving the expected level of literacy, significantly above the national average of 71%. Similarly, 83% of Primary 7 pupils in West Lothian were achieving the expected level of numeracy, compared to 76% for Scotland as a whole.

The number of West Lothian pupils achieving the expected level in Primary 1 across five key indicators was 3.4% above the national average, rising to 7.6% in Primary 4 and 8% in Primary 7.

West Lothian pupils were ranked top for achievement at primary school level amongst our comparator authorities, which are other council areas with similar demographics and levels of deprivation. They were rated as third highest for achievement for the whole of Scotland, with only primary pupils from the significantly more affluent areas of East Renfrewshire and East Dunbartonshire rated higher.

Literacy and numeracy attainments gaps for primary pupils were smaller in West Lothian than the national levels and have been continually decreasing since 2018/19.

An official opening took place at the modern, new purpose-built facility in the same campus as the James Young High School, which brings all Cedarbank pupils together under one roof for the first time.

Cedarbank provides quality education for secondary pupils with additional learning needs from around West Lothian, and was previously spread over three locations.

Invited guests were treated to music by talented school pupils, with Executive councillor for education Andrew McGuire unveiling a special plaque to mark the occasion.

Councillor Andrew McGuire said: "It's a huge privilege to be invited to open the amazing new Cedarbank School.

"The new £7 million Cedarbank School has been specially designed to meet the needs of the pupils, providing the perfect environment to support their learning.

"West Lothian already has one of the best school estates in Scotland, and this investment will make a positive difference to local children for many years to come."

Cedarbank Headteacher Carol McDonald added: "It was fantastic to welcome everyone to Cedarbank to celebrate the official opening of our school.

"The school environment has a key part to play in reducing barriers for young people with additional support needs, and our new school's features such as the acoustic panelling to reduce noise, clear spacious classrooms and easy access

to the outdoors, will make a huge difference to our young people."

"At Cedarbank, we celebrate each individual's unique strengths, abilities and talents and see our key role as caring for our young people and providing them with a wide range of motivating learning opportunities. The new location of the school has already led to a number of new partnerships which have increased the variety of opportunities available for our learners."

Two West Lothian schools to benefit from £1.7 million investment

Major improvement work is taking place at Kirkhill Primary in Broxburn and Livingston Village Primary.

A joint £1.7 million renovation and extension programme will see major works carried out at both schools.

Kirkhill Primary will see close to £1.2 million invested to refurbish part of the existing school into a new modern nursery. The work, which includes a new roof, is currently ongoing and is expected to be complete by August 2023.

Nearly £500,000 is being invested in Livingston Village Primary to deliver enhanced dining and social spaces for pupils, as well as reconfiguring a storage area to provide increased learning spaces. Work is expected to be completed in Autumn 2023.

Executive councillor for education Andrew McGuire said: "I'm delighted to see further investment of £1.7 million to improve two more West Lothian schools.

"West Lothian already has one of the best school estates in the country, and investment like this will ensure we give our children the best possible platform for learning."

Both projects are being carried out by West Lothianbased Maxi Construction following a competitive tendering process. Maxi have delivered a number of successful projects on behalf of the council in recent years, including the new Whitburn Partnership Centre and an extension to Blackridge Primary.

John Aitchison, Maxi Construction's Managing Director, added: "The award of these contracts enables us to build on our established relationship with West Lothian Council and adds to our extensive experience in the provision of upgraded and extended education facilities."

New Beatlie school taking shape



Excellent progress is being made on delivering a superb new dedicated school for West Lothian children with severe, complex and medical support needs.

Work on the fantastic new £15 million Beatlie School Campus in Craigshill, Livingston, is ongoing, with the majority of external works complete and most internal works now well underway.

Beatlie School provides specialist education for pupils aged three to eighteen with severe and complex support and profound medical needs.

The new purpose-built facility, in its new location at Craigswood in Livingston, will be a centre of excellence for children and young people, providing cutting-edge educational facilities when it opens later this year.

Beatlie headteacher Carol Robbie said: "It's great to see our fabulous new Beatlie School Campus progressing so well.

"Everyone in the Beatlie community is looking forward to moving into the finished school, which will have a real positive impact on the level of education and care we can provide our children and young people."

The project is part of a huge investment in schools for pupils with additional support needs, which also includes a new £7.5 million Cedarbank School in and a £5.8 million redevelopment of Pinewood School in Blackburn which were completed recently.

"I'm delighted that the work to deliver the new Beatlie School Campus is progressing on track. West Lothian has one of the best school estates in Scotland and we invested heavily to ensure our pupils have the best possible platform for learning, especially those for our pupils with additional support needs."

To ensure customers have guaranteed access and reduced waiting times, an online booking system will also be in place for all vehicles entering the CRCs - similar to the system currently used for vans and trailers.

- All five Recycling Centres will be maintained, but they will no longer be open 7 days a week.
- At least two Recycling Centres will be open each weekday, from 10am to 6pm.
- As weekends are the most popular days to visit, all five sites will be open every Saturday and Sunday.
- 85% of all visits are made to Oakbank, Blackburn and Whitburn Recycling Centres, with just 15% choosing to visit Linlithgow and Broxburn.
- The three busier sites will be open for more days than the quieter sites when the operating hours change.
- An online booking system will operate to ensure residents can access

Executive councillor for the environment and sustainability Tom Conn said:

"West Lothian will continue to have a significant number of CRCs compared to other areas - especially given our size.

"In Falkirk, for example, a similar council to West Lothian in terms of population size, there are two CRCs and this has been the case for some time. Both are also open part time and both have moved to an online booking system.

I believe this highlights that this isn't a decision that West Lothian faces alone. All councils face extremely tough decisions in order that we can balance our budgets. We simply cannot continue to deliver the same level of service with the levels of funding available to us.

"It is not the case that councils want to cut any of our services; we have to work with the budgets we have and unless there is more funding, we are forced to make extremely tough decisions."

Booking a Visit

The online booking system is currently operating for vans and trailers only, if you visit a Recycling Centre in a car at the moment you do not need to make a

When the operating hours change in the Autumn everyone visiting a Recycling Centre, in any vehicle, will need to book their visit in advance.

Recycling Centres are provided to dispose of household waste only, and to make a booking you will need to be resident in West Lothian.

The booking system will secure access for your visit, meaning you can spend less time queueing in traffic and waiting to unload your waste.

From Autumn 2023

Before you travel to a Recycling Centre you will need to book a visit through the Council's website.

- You will be able to see which Recycling Centres have availability, and select a date and time for your visit.
- Bookings can be made on the day or up to a fortnight in advance.
- You will receive a confirmation email for your vehicle registration.
- Once you have made your booking just arrive at the Recycling Centre you've chosen, on the date and within the time slot booked.



New housing project for Livingston

The planned delivery of 49 new council houses including supported housing for young people has moved a step closer.

The council's plans will consist of 28 houses specifically for young people with onsite support, including 16 flats which can be converted into mainstream housing in the future.

The project will also provide 21 new council homes which will be available for mainstream housing with a mix of two- and three-bedroom houses. All accommodation will have parking and external spaces in line with new build standards.

The joint £9.1 million project will be located at Almondvale Crescent, Livingston and both will be built as a single project which will deliver efficiencies both in terms of cost and time.

The council will work with partners, Hub South East, to look at feasibility work on different construction methods to enable the project to be delivered within budget. The proposed new

facility is subject to statutory consents being secured, including planning permission. Depute Leader of West Lothian Council, Councillor Kirsteen Sullivan said:

"I believe it is vital that we continue to support young people who are experiencing hardship and cannot find alternative accommodation. The provision of additional housing is urgently required. Officers need to ensure that the solution that delivers best value for the council requires to be developed as part of the design process.

"The site we have chosen is close to amenities with the college, hospital, transport and shopping facilities all within walking distance. These are all important factors in choosing a site that is specifically designed to help young people in need."





Beecraigs, Polkemmet and Almondell and Calderwood country parks are free to visit and offer superb scenery, forest walks, fun activities and fascinating history for the whole family.



The home of the historic Baillie Estate, Polkemmet Country Park has a wealth of history within its grounds, including the old boating and carp pond and the Baillie Family Mausoleum.

The original stable and tack room buildings of the former country house remain and now house a small Visitor Centre for information and refreshments which can be contacted on 01501743905.

The park is also home to a ninehole golf course and driving range, and almost 4km of waymarked picturesque woodland walks alongside the River Almond. Look out for The Horn, a 79ft-high stainless-steel trumpet artwork, on your way around the Blue Route.

The popular children's play area has recently been upgraded with additional inclusive and accessible play equipment, including sensory play panels and a wheelchair roundabout.

Close by is the Dardanelles steam train, which is a genuine piece of history from West Lothian's coal mining days.

Almondell & Calderwood



Bus service update

West Lothian Council has stepped in to fund a number of subsidised bus services, following recent significant changes within the commercial network.



Why?

McGill's Eastern Scottish have submitted registrations to the Office of the Traffic Commissioner which seek to amend their commercial local bus network within West Lothian.

West Lothian Council has no influence or authority over their commercial operation. Councils do not have any role in regulating the commercial bus network, which (in West Lothian) represents around 80% of bus journeys.

The changes will also affect subsidised contracts held by McGill's and came into effect from Monday 8 May.

Impact

The commercial network change will also impact on the relatively small number of council subsidised contracts held by McGill's. The council uses limited funding to support around 20% of local bus services, to fill gaps in the commercial bus network.

Action

Due to the reduction in the number of subsided services that McGill's provides, the council has agreed that subsidised funding, that would have been used for these services, is spent on bus services that provide a transport option for people that would otherwise have no travel choices at all – specifically

within the Blackridge and Greenrigg areas.

The council has agreed to award a subsidised contract LBS 10 to McGill's Eastern Scottish to extend the 21 service to provide a connection between Blackridge and Bathgate via Armadale. The council has also agreed a contribution to Strathclyde Partnership for Transport to reinstate a bus service linking Whitburn with the Shotts area, which will provide a connection for residents in Greenrigg.

McGills have now introduced their revised service.

The council is also exploring

the use of developer funding to re-establish any lost connection from Winchburgh to areas such as Livingston.

The council has also written to Kevin Stewart MSP, the Scottish Government's Minister for Transport to ask him to reinstate the COVID recovery support for buses.

Key points:

These changes will see the largest commercial network change by an operator in a number of years and will impact journey options for passengers. 80% of bus services in West Lothian are commercial services, and West Lothian Council has no influence or authority over their commercial poperation.

The council receives no Scottish Government funding to provide a local bus service and the council did not reject, nor was offered, revenue funding from the Scottish Government for bus services

The Transport Act 1985 deregulated bus services in the UK, moving from council-run buses to an open commercial market.

advice, assistance and advocacy in Welfare Benefits, Energy Advice, Money and Debt and Housing Advice.

Depute Council Leader Kirsteen Sullivan said: "Benefits exist to help people who need that extra support and it's clear through our work that many people don't realise that they are entitled to that additional support. £15 billion of benefits are going unclaimed across the UK and a significant proportion of those missing out will stay in West Lothian. I'd urge local people to contact us as quickly as possible and arrange for a benefits check. It can be done online, over the phone or in person and it doesn't take long to do."

News in brief

Changes to the process for lodging licensing applications



Following improvements designed at making it quicker and easier to lodge licensing applications, customers are now able to go online to access licensing application forms and make payments.

Applications and payments are no longer accepted at council payment offices or other council buildings.

This covers applications and payments for the following licenses:

- Alcohol licences
- Gambling licences
- Hire car licences
- HMO licences

Various types of civic government licences e.g. street traders, public entertainment etc

Roof replacement works at Fauldhouse Partnership Centre

Work has been taking place as part of an £830,000 programme to replace part of the roof at Fauldhouse Partnership Centre. The full replacement of the roof above the sports hall was approved by Council Executive, and is required after inspections found water damage was affecting the reinforced autoclaved aerated concrete (RAAC) roof planks. The project will be completed in this summer.

Planning permission granted for over 400 homes at Bangour

A planning application has been approved for the development of 357 houses and 55 flats at the site of the former Bangour Village Hospital to the west of Dechmont.

The application from site owners, Ambassador Developments (Bangour) Limited, was approved subject to conditions, by West Lothian Development Management Committee.

This is the first detailed application for residential development on the site with planning permission in principle already in place for the master plan for the redevelopment of the Bangour Village Hospital area. A new primary school and new village hall are just two elements proposed to be delivered in the

future as part of the master plan. The new homes will be a mix of private and affordable housing with a number of listed buildings in the area set to be retained.

Almond Valley application approved

Almond Valley Heritage Centre's plans to create a new access and carry out upgrades to their car park have been approved by the council. Planning permission was granted by West Lothian Council's Development Management Committee.

Almond Valley Heritage Centre has been granted permission to move their existing entrance and main access route 50m further north. The current entrance will be closed and replaced with gates and planters. The relocation of the access away from the front of the building will make the area around the building entrance safer for pedestrians, in particular families and children. The existing informal footpath which is located at the proposed new entrance point will be replaced by a formal pedestrian access, which will allow people to continue to use the route connecting Millfield to Thirlfield Wynd.

New electric car vehicle charging tariffs now in place



New tariffs for West Lothian's electric vehicle (EV) public charging network have been introduced.

West Lothian Council owns a total of 32 public charge points at seventeen locations.

There are a number of charge points operated by other organisations, including those located at railway stations

As the uptake of electric vehicles and the use of council owned facilities has increased, so have the costs of operating and maintaining the network and infrastructure. These costs are currently met by West Lothian Council, which is not sustainable given the rising cost of electricity.

Introducing charges for councilowned charging points allows the council to recover the costs of operating the network, maximise the availability of rapid chargers by improving driver behaviour and encourage private investment in the network, further increasing provision of EV charging points in future - which is widely seen as a way to help meet the future growth of electric vehicles and demand for charging points. The majority of Scotland's councils already have tariffs in place for public owned charging points.

The new tariffs cover the costs incurred for the unit cost of electricity, maintenance and future investment and expansion of new EV charging points.

Drivers using the network must ensure they register details with ChargePlace Scotland. Details on how to do so can be found by chargeplacescotland.org

Pharmacy lease approved at Strathbrock

West Lothian Council has approved a ten year lease extension for the Pharmacy Unit at Strathbrock Partnership Centre.
The council currently grants a lease of the unit to Lloyds Pharmacy.
The current lease was due to expire in July but has now been extended to 2033.

Preferred option for future of St Kentigern's

A £30 million proposal to secure the long-term future of St Kentigern's Academy in Blackburn has been supported.

Council Executive voted to continue to progress a preferred option for St Kentigern's, that would see the parts of the school affected by reinforced autoclaved aerated concrete (RAAC) roof planks demolished and a new wing constructed in the same location. A further £10 million has been allocated towards delivering this three-year project, taking the total funding commitment by the council to £20.2 million. This leaves £10 million outstanding, and it was agreed to approach the Scottish Government for financial support for the remaining funding required to deliver the project, as further borrowing would negatively impact on the budget available for education in West Lothian. Design work will continue over the summer, with the aim of a further report back to committee in

Design work will continue over the summer, with the aim of a further report back to committee in Autumn 2023 to give final approval for the project, if additional funding can be secured.

An additional £300,000 was

also allocated to maintain the temporary units at the school for a further year to provide the additional classroom space necessary in the short-term.

Legacy of Chattel Slavery

Established in 2021, the West Lothian Legacy of Chattel Slavery Working Group is exploring local links to transatlantic slavery and colonialism.

This work was initiated against the backdrop of the Black Lives Matter movement and a growing awareness of the role which Scotland and its people had in the history of transatlantic slavery and British colonialism.

A thematic review document has been developed by the group. This highlights the ways in which transatlantic slavery and colonialism touched all aspects of life.

A number of Conversation Events have taken place. Information and views gathered at these events will support the Working Group in making recommendations to West Lothian Council. These recommendations will outline actions that might be taken to acknowledge the history of the past and will also help to tackle the racial discrimination and inequalities still experienced by people from our ethnically diverse communities.
